Admission requirements

A 3-year (180 ECTS) B.A. or equivalent degree acquired in Germany or abroad in Archaeologies, Asian or Islamic Art History, Comparative Religious Studies, Egyptology, English Studies, German Studies, History, History of the Islamicate World, History of Law, Japanese Studies, Korean Studies, Latin American Studies, Slavic Studies, Social Sciences, South East Asian Studies, Theologies, Tibetan Studies, or similar disciplines.

Minimum Grade: 2,5

Language requirements

- ▶ C1 proficiency in English (documented by, e.g., a B.A. program taught entirely in English, minimum scores of TOEFL iBT 94/IELTS 7.0)
- ▶ German language proficiency is not required.
- ▶ Proficiency in source languages is recommended.

Costs

- ▶ "university fee" (~600 € p.a.)
- ▶ living expenses

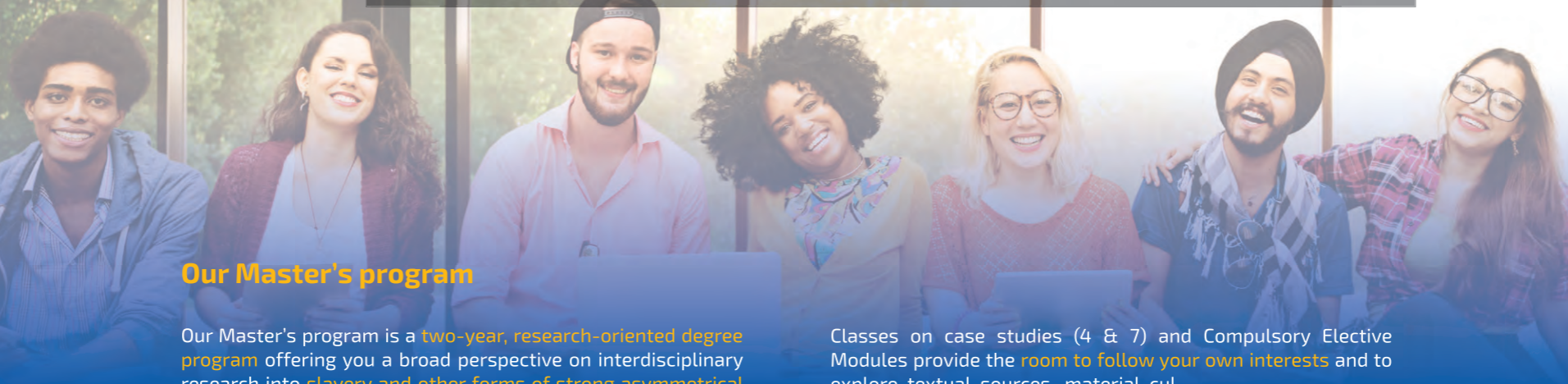

Our Master's program

Our Master's program is a **two-year, research-oriented degree program** offering you a broad perspective on interdisciplinary research into **slavery and other forms of strong asymmetrical dependencies** through time and space.

The basic modules (1–3) establish a sound knowledge of relevant historical phenomena as well as the methodological and theoretical tools to pursue your own study and research interests. In accordance with the **broad perspective and innovative character** of our program, the study program includes classes on transcultural comparison and current research debates (5 & 6).

Specialize in Dependency and Slavery Studies

Classes on case studies (4 & 7) and Compulsory Elective Modules provide the **room to follow your own interests** and to explore textual sources, material culture, and data. **Special support** is offered to improve your source language skills.

Develop your individual research profile

The Compulsory Elective Modules also offer the opportunity to do an **internship in national or international institutions**.

The fourth semester is dedicated to preparing and writing your Master's thesis.

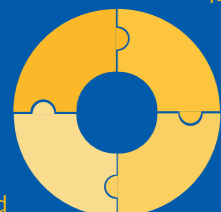
